GRANT FOR THE PUBLICATION OF TAIWANESE WORKS IN TRANSLATION (GPT)

MINISTRY OF CULTURE, REPUBLIC OF CHINA (TAIWAN) GPT is set up by The Ministry of Culture to encourage the publication of Taiwanese works in translation overseas, to raise the international visibility of Taiwanese cultural content, and to help Taiwan's publishing industry expand into non-Chinese international markets.

- Applicant Eligibility: Foreign publishing houses (legal persons) legally registered in accordance with the laws and regulations of their respective countries.
- Conditions:
 - 1. The so-called Taiwanese works must meet the following requirements:
 - A. Use traditional characters;
 - B. Written by a natural person holding an R.O.C. identity card;
 - C. Has been assigned an ISBN in Taiwan. i.e., the author is a native of Taiwan, and the first 6 digits of the book's ISBN are 978-957-XXX-XXX-X, 978-986-XXX-XXX-X, or 978-626-XXX-XXX-X.
 - 2. Applications must include documents certifying that the copyright holder of the Taiwanese works consents to its translation and foreign publication (no restriction on its format).
 - 3.A translation sample of the Taiwanese work is required (no restriction on its format and length).

- 4. The translated work must be published within two years, after the first day of the relevant application period.
- Grant Items:
- 5. The maximum grant available for each project is NT\$600,000, which covers:
 - A. Licensing fees (going to the copyright holder of the Taiwanese works);
 - B. Translation fees;
 - C. Marketing and promotion fees (limited to economy class air tickets for the R.O.C. writer to participate in overseas promotional activities related to the project);
 - D. Book production-oriented fees;
 - E. Tax (20% of the total award amount);
 - F. Remittance-related handling fees.
- 6. Priority consideration is given to books that have received the Golden Tripod Award, the Golden Comic Award, or the Taiwan Literature Award.
- Application Period: Twice every year, from April 1 to April 30, and from October 1 to October 31. The MOC reserves the right to change the application periods, and will announce said changes separately.
- Announcement of successful applications: Winners will be announced within three months of the end of the application period.
- Application Method: Please visit the Ministry's official website (https://grants.moc.gov.tw/ Web_ENG/), and use the online application system.

VISUALIZING TAIWAN: THE STORY OF TAIWAN IN THIRTY OBJECTS

看得見的臺灣史

Every museum artifact has a story which can tell us something important about the age in which it was produced. Leveraging the collection of the National Museum of Taiwan History, this threevolume series promotes greater public understanding of Taiwan's complex history through the lens of physical artifacts.

The first volume, *A Spatial History*, explores how people from around the world have depicted and imagined this island nation through thirty maps produced from the 16th to the 21st centuries. Each map is a representative of a certain view of Taiwan, delineating political, ethnic, and cultural boundaries, while also providing a springboard from which to explore the richly diverse social spaces that emerged through the transcendence of those boundaries.

In volume two, *The Ordinary and the Extraordinary of Museum Artifacts*, thirty ordinary objects help to illuminate the relationship between the lives of common people and the historical eras in which they lived. Whether these objects were used in funerals, weddings, and celebrations, or in everyday life; or they were specific to times of war, upheaval, and martial law, all were integral parts of the lives of real people who experienced Taiwan's history first-hand.

Volume three, *Life Stories*, makes use of thirty artifacts from the museum's collection to highlight Taiwan's human diversity, spanning the categories of class, ethnicity, gender, and historical era. From English ornithologist John Gould to the Taiwanese subjects of the Empire of Japan, each object unveils the complex web of cultural influences that run throughout Taiwan's history, and shaped the identities of the island's inhabitants.

Visualizing Taiwan was produced through the collaborative efforts of researchers and writers from the National Museum of Taiwan History. Combining scientific and historical methods, the series uses the tangible artifacts to provide an accessible new angle on Taiwan history.



Over the last thirty years China has undergone a remarkable transformation from being the world's factory to becoming the second largest economy globally. In recent years, however, the geopolitical ambitions of Xi Jinping and the adoption of "wolfwarrior" diplomacy have triggered backlash against China's rise, thrusting democratic Taiwan into the international spotlight as a potential flashpoint for a US-China conflict. Xi Jinping's Chinese Dream, intended to assure the global community of China's commitment to peaceful development and win-win cooperation, is increasingly viewed as a code word for China's ambitions of regional dominance and the right to transgress international norms. Confronted by this shift in tone from Beijing, and the realignment of a once-stable global order, what can be done to preserve peace and prosperity in the region?

The book begins by examining the US-China trade war, unraveling its origins and development, and then proceeds to explore the evolution of the Chinese economy from the era of Deng Xiaoping to current leadership under Xi Jinping. The repercussions of Chinese economic policy on global capital markets are analyzed, with particular emphasis on the situation of Hong Kong. Lastly, the author directs attention to Taiwan, formulating an economic strategy for a world in which globalization is giving way to regionalization, and established norms are increasingly challenged by autocratic nations.

A keen observer of economic and financial trends, author Hsieh Chin-He has studied China for over forty years, witnessing the country's spectacular rise. Writing from the frontlines of China's regional ambitions, he presents a clear-eyed analysis of the ways in which China's rise has altered the global order, and charts a course for continued regional peace and prosperity amid heightened US-China competition.

Forged in the aftermath of the Second World War, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights was a reaction to the mass devastation and suffering unleashed by the war. The desire to avert future catastrophes motivated the formation of the United Nations in 1948, and first order of business of the fledgling organization was to pass the thirty articles of the declaration.

Chapter by chapter, this book provides detailed explanations of the concepts underlying each of the thirty articles, supplemented by examples that will be familiar to contemporary readers: from pop-singer Britney Spears' lawsuit to break free from her father's guardianship, to the boycott of Xinjiang cotton by international brands, to the legalization of same-sex marriage in Taiwan. Other issues addressed include labor rights, the rights of refugees, the death penalty, children's rights, the right to education, the right to privacy, and much more. Each chapter concludes with guided discussion questions to encourage deeper reflection on the nature of our basic rights. An appendix of reflections penned by influential human rights workers provides additional food for thought.

Upon returning to Taiwan, Kenny leverages the connections he has made to organize industry expos like the one that kick-started his own career.

Unfortunately, the arrival of the pandemic puts a damper on business, prompting Kenny to adapt once more. This time, he becomes an adult film talent agent, utilizing his experience and connections to contribute to the development of Taiwan's domestic porn industry. His first-hand account of the nascent industry details everything from preparing everything needed on set (tissues, condoms, lubricant...), to coordinating a shoot, to giving actors pep-talks so they can perform to their full potential, illustrating the essential role that talent agents play within the industry.

With objectivity and humor, Yes, I Am "That" Porn Industry Talent Agent takes readers on a wild (and well-lubricated) ride, unveiling the true face of the adult film industry. Kenny's personal account of his unique career trajectory provides a valuable perspective on a world that is normally obscured as much by fantasy as it is by taboos and moral condemnation.

A FAT MAN / A BETTER MAN: THE WAY TOWARD BEING INTEGRATED 我僅僅只是一個胖子

Growing up in Taiwan, a society where thinness is akin to virtue, Tsai Pei-Yuan always felt he was treated differently. Throughout school and his professional life, his pudgy body was something he could neither escape from, nor bring himself to fully face. It wasn't until graduate school that he made the courageous decision to begin writing about his life, hoping to come to terms with the difficulties and frustrations he had endured while growing up fat.

In A Fat Man / A Better Man, Tsai Pei-Yuan embarks on an introspective journey in two parts. He begins by chronicling the negative life experiences he encountered due to his body type: the peers who said he would never find a girlfriend unless he lost weight, the P.E. teacher who told him fat people can't be winners, and the coworkers who always assumed he couldn't carry out basic physical tasks.

The latter half of the book is a sociological exploration of the stereotypes applied to people with excess body fat. Far too often, society assumes that larger people lack self-control, suffer from poor health, or have underlying emotional issues. Through examples drawn from his own life experiences, Tsai Pei-Yuan illustrates how these negative images are imposed onto overweight individuals. When the author was excused from obligatory military service due to his weight, it reinforced the image of fatness as something akin to a handicap. Airlines mandating the purchase of multiple seats and weight limits on amusement park rides all conspire to limit freedom of movement, making the overweight feel like second-class citizens. As the author dissects the labels imposed on heavier people, he gradually dismantles his own assumptions and beliefs about his

body, health, and relationship to food. Through the process of writing, he begins to see his difficulties in a new light, ultimately learning to live with greater ease and self-acceptance.

Deftly alternating between personal anecdotes and sociological analysis, Tsai Pei-Yuan's writing brims with insight, humor, and authenticity. A deceptively light read that is never short on depth, *A Fat Man / A Better Man* will inspire readers to consider new perspectives, and challenge their existing beliefs about bodyweight and physical appearance. 66

WALKING THE MARKET 菜場搜神記: 一個不買菜女子的市場踏查日記

A uthor and photographer Su Ling's obsession with traditional markets began in university. Once while strolling through a local market, a profound yearning was awakened by the old-timey foods and outdated turns of phrase she encountered. This inspired her to visit markets all across Taiwan, documenting the images, voices, and stories that populate these time-honored hubs of commerce.

Su Ling's quest to uncover the sources of her nostalgia is a personal one, and her photographs and writing unfailingly reflect her unique perspective. In one market, her eyes might be drawn to the grammatical errors in a hand-written sign; in another, a century-old cutting board still in use at a food stall. Alternatively, she might become entranced by the whimsical life story of a market vendor, or the changing economic fortunes of a market over the course of history.

In Walking the Market, Su Ling highlights the human element in thirty-one markets from across Taiwan. Her pen lovingly details the unique atmosphere of each market and the larger-than-life characters that inhabit them. As captivated as she is by the lives of others, Su Ling's chronicle ultimately concludes on a personal note. The nostalgia evoked by her journey is traced back to her childhood, where, in the final section of the book, Su Ling shifts through cherished memories of food and family, and lovingly details the comfort foods of home.

In photographs and writing, Su Ling captures the vibrantly human spirit that enlivens Taiwan's local markets, documenting the everyday lives of vendors, the humorous banter of market-goers, and the frequently astonishing stories overheard along the way. The sights, scents, and sounds of the market spring from the page, immersing readers in a reassuring world ruled by neighborly feeling and nostalgia, where ordinary lives provide extraordinary glimpses into the human heart.





Although there have been suspicious circumstances in nearly every case, the families of the victims have declined to press for further investigations.

Su Fang-Chi's questions about the deaths soon attract the attention of police officer Chou Cheng, and the two begin working together. Chou Cheng reopens investigations into the deaths while Su Fang-Chi uses her status as a social worker to visit the homes of each of the victims. She discovers that each of them contains an idol depicting a motherly figure embracing a baby with two arms, while the other two arms are held behind the back, concealing a knife and a sword. It turns out the mothers of the victims are all devout followers of a new religion which they believed would help steer their wayward children back to the path of righteousness.

Thus, Su Fang-Chi decides to infiltrate this religious organization to learn if it is somehow connected to the teens' deaths, and hopefully prevent any further deaths from occurring. Step by step, Su Fang-Chi works her way into the inner circle of the cult, discovering too late that she has already been ensnared in a trap laid by the cult leader.

Incorporating diverse social issues from juvenile delinquency to cults, *Fractures* is a spine-tingling horror novel that reveals how the most needy among us are often the most easily betrayed. In the depths of desperation, with no one to turn to, the most frightening thing isn't a ghost or even a bloodthirsty deity, but our own wishful thinking.


